War in Ukraine	<ul> <li>The War in Ukraine is an ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine (see maps on Page 2)         <ul> <li>Began when Russia unlawfully annexed Crimea in 2014, violating Ukrainian sovereignty</li> <li>Continued as Russia fomented civil-war in the Donbas region of Ukraine</li> <li>Escalated into war via the Russian Invasion of Ukraine in 2022, in violation of international law</li> <li>Met with unexpected Ukrainian resistance that successfully prevented a swift Russian victory</li> <li>Has settled into a stalemate; neither side appears able to quickly achieve a strategic military victor</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

History of Ukraine	<ul> <li>800s Borderland: The land between Europe &amp; Russia is known as 'the borderland' (<i>krajina</i>)</li> <li>882 Kyivan Rus: A medieval state that included both Ukraine &amp; Russia had its capital in Kyiv</li> <li>1240 Mongolian Invasion: Mongols destroyed Kyiv, leading to centuries of foreign rule in Ukraine</li> <li>1300s Polish-Lithuania: Western Ukraine came under Polish-Lithuanian influence and control</li> <li>1700s Russian Empire: Ukraine was absorbed into the Russian Empire, with diminished autonomy</li> <li>1922 Soviet Union: Ukraine became a republic in the Soviet Union, with limited independence</li> <li>1954 Control of Crimea: The Soviet Union transferred control of Crimea from Russia to Ukraine</li> </ul>				
	<ul> <li>1994 Budapest Memorandum: Ukraine denuclearized (with Russia/U.S./U.K. security assurances) Partnership for Peace: A NATO program tried to build cooperation between the West &amp; East</li> <li>2004 Orange Revolution: Ukrainian protest led to a new election after pro-Russian meddling</li> <li>2014 Revolution of Dignity: Ukrainian protest ousted the pro-Russian President Viktor Yanukovych</li> </ul>

Build-up to War	<ul> <li>2014 Russia Annexed Crimea: Russia violated Ukraine's sovereignty by annexing Crimea War in the Donbas: Russia violated Ukraine's sovereignty by fomenting war in the Donbas</li> <li>2015 Minsk Peace Agreements: All sides agreed to peace in the Donbas (but fighting continued)</li> <li>2016 Hybrid Warfare: Russia continued to create unrest in eastern Ukraine</li> <li>2017 U.S. Support: The U.S. supported Ukraine with offensive weapons like the Javelin missile</li> <li>2018 Kerch Strait Incident: Russia captured Ukrainian naval vessels, escalating tensions Church Split: The Orthodox Church of Ukraine separated from the Russian Orthodox Church</li> <li>2019 Volodymyr Zelensky: Was elected President of Ukraine to seek economic reforms</li> <li>2020 Hybrid Warfare: Russia escalated disinformation campaigns in Ukraine and Western nations</li> <li>2021 Russian Demands: Russia demanded Ukraine's submission with 100,000 troops on border</li> </ul>
